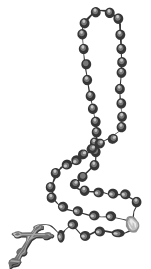
Server Appreciation Event

THE PASTOR'S BLOG

We are about to celebrate high school graduation. Congratulations to all graduates. Tonight (Sunday) we will celebrate baccalaureate at the McFarland Lutheran Church at 7:00 P.M. I hope that our parish graduates plan on attending.

As most of our graduates continue on to further studies, parents and our parish wonder about their religious future. Will the sectarian aspects of campus life lead them to abandon their religion? As usual CARA (Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate) has published a study on this. You may go to www.CARA.georgetown.edu to read the entire paper "Catholicism on Campus: Stability and Change in Catholic Student Faith by College Types".

The paper studies specifically Catholic colleges in the United States and it relates the research to Catholics who attend non-Catholic colleges. "Catholic students in Catholic colleges are not becoming 'less' Catholic by this experience as some have argued. Instead, attending Catholic colleges and universities has a weak but positive influence on students' beliefs, attitudes and worship."

The analysis is based upon 1,941 interviews at 34 Catholic colleges and universities and another 1,418 interviews of Catholic students who attended non-Catholic schools (public and private). It measured the difference of responses of the same students in both their freshman and junior years.

Catholics at Catholic colleges and universities attended Mass at 34 percent versus those at non-Catholic schools with a rate of 19 percent.

They registered at a parish at the rate of 75 percent versus 55 percent.

They agreed that "I seriously consider the Church's statements, such as those of the Pope and U.S. Bishops, on social, political, and moral issues at a rate of 55 percent compared to 28 percent.

They agreed that "all human life, from conception to natural death, is sacred. For this reason, the taking of life – whether through abortion, the death penalty, or assisted suicide – is wrong" was 53 percent compared to 35 percent.

They disagreed that "a woman should have the right whether or not to abort an unwanted pregnancy" 44 percent compared to 24 percent.

Read the entire article because it is very difficult to summarize. There are various caveats written in this study. "These positive effects [of Catholic colleges and universities] are likely primarily a result of self-selection."

Roman Missal



In 2010 the long-discussed Third Typical Edition of the sacramentary (which will then be called the Roman Missal) will be completed. This is the red prayer book that is used during Mass. Publication will follow after the final translation has been published.

There will be many things written on the Internet, in blogs, and in popular journals regarding the forthcoming Third Edition of the Roman Missal. The U.S. Bishops Committee on Divine Worship has requested that we remind people of our Diocese that their website will contain authoritative material that has been reviewed by the Bishop members of the Committee. Material on other websites and news outlets may or may not be authoritative or correct.

If you go on the Internet to [www.madisondiocese.org/Roman Missal](http://www.madisondiocese.org/RomanMissal), you may view the study edition. This may not be used until final approval. It is only the study edition.

“Consubstantialem Patri” in the *Roman Missal*

Q. In the Niceno-Constantinopolitan Creed, why has “one being with the Father” been changed to “consubstantial with the Father”?

A. The new translation is more in keeping with the ancient Latin text of the Creed and a more accurate translation.

The bishops at the Council of Nicea (AD 325), in order to ensure that Jesus was professed as the eternal Son of God, equal to the Father, stated that he is “the Son of God, begotten from the Father, the only-begotten, that is from the substance of the Father, God of God, light from light, true God from true God, begotten not made, the same substance (*homoousion*) with the Father ...” The Creed of the Council of Constantinople (381), which is professed at all Sunday Masses and Solemnities within the Catholic Church, similarly stated: “We believe in one Lord Jesus Christ, the only Son of God, eternally begotten of the Father, God from God, Light from Light, true God from true God, begotten, not made, of the same substance (*homoousion*) with the Father.”

When these two ancient creeds were translated into Latin, the term “*homoousion*” was rendered as “*consubstantialem*”, that is, “the same substance of the Father”. Prior to the Second Vatican Council, the Latin “*consubstantialem*” was rendered as “consubstantial” within the English translation of the Creed. Many theologians and the Holy See thought that the term “consubstantial” was more in keeping with the Latin tradition and a more literal and accurate translation than the more recent “one in being”.

This is in keeping with the mind of the Congregation for Divine Worship and the Discipline of the Sacraments, which published an Instruction, entitled *Liturgiam Authenticam*. It stated: “Certain expressions that belong to the heritage of the whole or of a great part of the ancient Church, as well as others that have become part of the general human patrimony, are to be respected by a translation that is as literal as possible” (no. 56).

Six Questions on the Translation on *Pro Multis* (from the November 2006 Newsletter - © 2008 USCCB)

1. What does the decision regarding the translation of *pro multis* mean?

After having consulted with Conferences of Bishops throughout the world, the Holy Father has decided that the translation of *qui pro vobis et pro multis effundetur in remissionem peccatorum*, presently translated “which will be shed for you and **for all**, so that sins may be forgiven”, will eventually be changed to “which will be shed for you and **for many**, so that sins may be forgiven”.

2. Should Priests make this change right away?

No. Absolutely no changes may be made until the new translation of the Roman Missal has been approved by the Bishops and confirmed by the Holy See. The completion of the Missal is at least several years away.

3. Why did the Holy Father choose to translate *pro multis* as *for many* and not as *for all*?

“For many” is a closer translation of the Latin phrase *pro multis* than the present translation.

4. Are the Masses which have used “for all” invalid?

Absolutely not. “There is no doubt whatsoever regarding the validity of Masses celebrated with the use of a duly approved formula containing a formula equivalent to ‘for all’”.¹ In his letter announcing the change, Cardinal Arinze makes clear that “the formula ‘for all’ would undoubtedly correspond to a correct interpretation of the Lord’s intention expressed in the text.”²

5. Does this mean that Christ did not die for everyone?

No. It is a dogmatic teaching of the Church that Christ died on the Cross for all men and women (cf. John 11:52, 2 Corinthians 5:14-15, Titus 2:11, 1 John 2:2).

6. Then why do the Latin words of institution say *pro multis*?

The Latin words of institution say that Christ shed his blood *pro multis* in the same sense that the synoptic Gospels use this term, as in the Last Supper narratives in the Gospels of Matthew and Mark:

Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, saying, “Drink from it, all of you, for this is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed on behalf of many for the forgiveness of sins.”³

Then he took a cup, gave thanks, and gave it to them, and they all drank from it. He said to them, “This is my blood of the covenant, which will be shed for many.”⁴

“The expression of ‘for many’, while remaining open to the inclusion of each human person, is reflective also of the fact that this salvation is not brought about in some mechanistic way, without one’s own willing or participation; rather, the believer is invited to accept in faith the gift that is being offered and to receive the supernatural life that is given to those who participate in this mystery, living it out in their lives as well so as to be numbered among the ‘many’ to whom the text refers.”⁵
