Word of Life

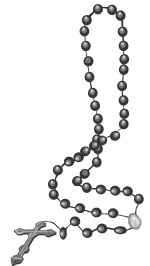
When Jesus speaks about eternal life, he is referring to real and true life, a life worthy of being lived. He is not simply speaking about life after death. Free Rosaries in Chapel

THE PASTOR'S BLOG

This is Independence Day Weekend. Happy Fourth of July! We celebrate our national holiday on Monday since the fourth is a Sunday. With the long weekend and the shortened work week, many people take a vacation. Some businesses mandate vacations this week to keep sufficient staff to run their businesses throughout the summer. This weekend likely has the lowest number of parishioners attending weekend liturgies of any weekend of the year. We are happy to celebrate with those who are home and those who are visiting McFarland.

Fireworks seem to be the most popular way of celebrating July 4th. In many localities fireworks are displayed on days other than the 4th. Having spent much of my life on the Mississippi River, I remember my father's observation "that if there were any more boats in the river there wouldn't be room for the water." I remember the sandbars packed with campers and the campers packed with mosquitoes.

The folks at marthastewart.com list Fourth of July traditions that I did not know. They include: clothespin pinwheels, patriotic bunting, patriotic stamped crafts, patriotic doormats, stamped paper fans, patriotic votives, star glasses, balloon fireworks, patriotic pins, fireworks fans, flag planters, and can-do cans.

What is central about the day, and what often gets lost in all the panoply of the day, is our Independence Day. This is the date of the completion of our Declaration of Independence from England. There was to be a long war fought for independence.

What is often forgotten is that every citizen did not want independence from England. There were loyalists who wanted to keep allegiance with the king. They feared mob rule and they wanted the protection of the mighty British army and navy. So they resisted the movement to independence.

Many of us do not know what happened to these folks. Some doubtless returned to England. But a segment fled to Niagara-on-the-Lake and began the English-speaking Canadian Province of Ontario. Niagara-on-the-Lake is situated at the mouth of the Niagara River as it flows into Lake Ontario. While the province is now centered in Toronto, Niagara-on-the-Lake remains today a quaint village with its summertime streets filled with tourists. The George Bernard Shaw Theatre attracts crowds to its plays each year. Those visiting Niagara Falls often miss this gem.

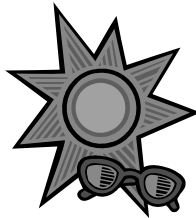

In 2010 the long-discussed Third Typical Edition of the sacramentary (which will then be called the Roman Missal) will be completed. This is the red prayer book that is used during Mass. Publication will follow after the final translation has been published. If you go on the Internet to www.madisondiocese.org/RomanMissal, you may view the study edition in its entirety. This may not be used until final approval. It is only the study edition.
